"I create interiors for life," says architect Inga Kordya. - Without deliberate flamboyant details, without reference to trends. When designing, the most important thing for me is an architectural approach, a functional, clean space where all the elements are interconnected and nothing is random."





"The source of inspiration for the creation of this project was the client himself - a young man with good taste, creative and open to everything new. This is not our first project together, so the work took place in an atmosphere of complete trust, on the same wave," continues Inga.

"The lifestyle and habits of the client determined not only the planning decision, which we will talk about a little later, but also the choice of some items. For example, it was immediately clear that among the iconic items in our living room would be the Eames Lounge Chair by Vitra. This creation of designers Charles and Ray Eames from 1956 did not accidentally become a cult object and was featured in several Bond movies that the client loved."



On the wall is a panel made of thin white ropes by the Dutch artist Matthias De Vogel. Like other works by this artist, it is a one-of-a-kind piece. Console, Flexform. Table lamp, Gubi. On the console is a sculpture by Sofia Karnukaeva.

"The centerpiece of the space was a sliding partition with very beautiful decorative glass from Glas Italia. But even before that, a textile panel by the Dutch artist Matthias de Vogel had appeared in the living room, which can be said to be the beginning of the whole story of this project. I have seen the work of this artist at an exhibition in France, and I immediately understood what our interior would be like - very laconic, light, woven out of the many subtle solutions that never get boring."





"Another functional object, which at the same time works as an art object, is a chandelier in the form of a cocoon made of golden wires. When you turn it on, a lot of thin beams spread across the ceiling, which descend smoothly to the furniture, creating a cozy and light atmosphere."

"As far as the layout is concerned, everything is very logical here. The space with windows on two sides is divided into a common area and a private area. I placed the kitchen-living room on the west side to admire the city in the sunset. The bedroom faces east to make it easier to wake up. In between is a block of bathrooms, a hallway and a walk-in closet."





"In a laconic interior there is no room for random details. If something is here, it must be for a good reason."

"Details, details, details again - this is the main rule of working on laconic interiors," says Inga. - In my projects I closely monitor the degree of tinting of the mirrors, choosing the one that gives a beautiful reflection of a person. In the bedroom I prefer to use a chandelier that rotates 360 degrees, which allows you to adjust it to your own needs. And there are a lot of similar subtleties that customers may not be aware of, but which cheer them up every day. And that, in my opinion, is almost the main goal of our work."
